Introduction

We acknowledge that School District No. 23 (Central Okanagan) operates within the traditional territory of the Okanagan Nation. In partnership with the Aboriginal communities of the Central Okanagan, the District is committed to upholding the following five guiding principles in support of Aboriginal student success. We believe that it is important to:

- Honour and acknowledge the people, traditional territory, and the history of the Okanagan people;
- Acknowledge the traditional teachings of the Elders and the wisdom of the Aboriginal culture;
- Promote a learning environment where Aboriginal students feel confident and proud of their ancestry;
- Provide educational opportunities that enhance academic success; and,
- Develop shared responsibility and mutual respect through ongoing dialogue and strong relationships that recognize the cultural differences and diverse needs of Aboriginal students.

Since 1994, the Central Okanagan School District has implemented an Aboriginal Education Program to foster cultural awareness, cultural pride, and improved student achievement for all Aboriginal learners (Kindergarten to Grade 12). This program has evolved over the years to meet the needs of Aboriginal students, families, and communities. The District's Aboriginal Education Program continues to be supported by the Ministry of Education through targeted funding. Funding is directly related to the number of Aboriginal students who identify themselves as having First Nations, Inuit or Métis ancestry.

This report serves as a means to outline some of the relevant District-wide achievement data, and provide a focus for continued discussion about the goals of Aboriginal Education in the District.

This Seventh Annual Report will address the four goals of the District's first Aboriginal Education Enhancement Agreement and the progress made toward reaching these goals.

The District's Aboriginal Education Committee (AEC) was formed in 2002 and meets monthly to provide recommendations for program enhancements and budget expenditures.

"Since the signing of our Enhancement Agreement, as a committee, the Aboriginal Education Committee has focused on implementing the Enhancement goals by increasing tutorial and CEA support in order to have success rates continue to grow, and enhancing cultural and language, physical activity, emotional support activities, and participation to give students a sense of belonging and pride."




Goals of the Enhancement Agreement for School District No. 23 (Central Okanagan)

The following goals, reflecting the teachings of the Medicine Wheel, support the emotional, spiritual, physical, and intellectual development of Aboriginal students in School District No. 23 (Central Okanagan).



Total Number and Percent of Students Identifying Themselves as Aboriginal

Over 2000 Aboriginal students self-identify each year. The District's Aboriginal students represent over 61 Bands and Nations from across Canada including status, non-status, Inuit, and Métis. Approximately 2.3% of all Aboriginal students (40 students) are from Okanagan Nation. Approximately 6% of all Aboriginal students (100 students) live on reserve.



In June 2010, 2215 Aboriginal students were enrolled in School District No. 23.

Emotional Goal

To Increase a Sense of Belonging, Self Respect, and Pride of Heritage for Aboriginal Students

Rationale

We believe that a student's sense of belonging is fundamental to their school success and overall wellbeing. District data indicates that absences and tardiness are higher for Aboriginal students than the general student population in elementary, middle, and secondary schools. Therefore, we are committed to implementing initiatives that increase Aboriginal students' sense of belonging, self respect, pride of heritage, and commitment to staying in school.

Student Performance Indicators

With the implementation of the District's new Data Warehousing program in 2009/2010, baseline data will be collected and reviewed.

New strategies and structures have been implemented to increase students' satisfaction and engagement within School District No. 23 (Central Okanagan).

These include:

- Aboriginal Student Gatherings (K–12).
- Spirit of N'ha-a-itk Art Bundles Leadership Training for Aboriginal students.
- Opening Ceremonies for various District and school events recognizing and honouring the Okanagan Territory and the culture, traditions, and languages of Aboriginal people.
- Gathering Rooms displaying student work, Honour Roll, and/or Work Ethic Lists.

Spiritual Goal

To Increase Awareness and Knowledge of Aboriginal History, Traditions, Culture, and Language

Rationale

The teachings of Aboriginal history, tradition, culture and language is critical to ensuring that this knowledge will be passed on to future generations of Aboriginal people.

Student Performance Indicators

 The Okanagan Language Program for the 2009/2010 school year was not offered due to a significant decline in enrollment. This past year we started after school clubs of Okanagan Culture and language. Finding a qualified language teacher remains a challenge.


Cross Cultural Program Across the District

Traditionally, Aboriginal cultural knowledge is transmitted and documented primarily through oral tradition, but also through such things as dramatic productions and dance performances.

This was successfully accomplished in 2009/2010 through multiple presentations throughout the district by Dallas Arcand, world class Hoop Dancer, as well as the Lelala Dancers from the Kwakawa Nation. They educated using traditional stories and drum songs. One of the students that attended Dallas Arcand's dance presentation said "Dallas is the best Native ever!!" Increasing pride in our children for their heritage and culture is our primary goal in the Aboriginal Cultural Program.

2. Decreased Number of Students Hungry in School

- Healthy breakfasts and snacks for Aboriginal students were provided through Community LINK funds.
- Healthy snacks were offered to Aboriginal students at Homework Clubs and in the Advocate rooms.

Rationale

Current Aboriginal students' performance in academic areas indicates that the learning community needs to focus on improving the number of Aboriginal students meeting and/or exceeding grade level expectations in reading, writing, and numeracy. Improved student performance will lead to a greater number of Aboriginal students achieving Dogwood graduation.

Early Literacy Intervention Profile Results


The District has developed an Early Literacy Intervention Profile to identify primary students who are at risk. Once identified, intervention strategies are implemented to support these students.






Increased Number of K- 9 Students Fully Meeting/Exceeding Expectations in Reading, Writing, and Numeracy


District Aboriginal Gr. 4 FSA Results Compared with District Non-Aboriginal FSA Results





<u>District Aboriginal Results Compared with Provincial Aboriginal</u>












District Aboriginal Grade 7 FSA Results Compared with District Non-Aboriginal Results






District Aboriginal Grade 7 FSA Results Compared with Provincial Aboriginal Results

Strategies to Enhance Intellectual Performance

Advocates

• The AEC voted to hire additional Advocates to provide emotional, social, and academic support to elementary students. With additional staffing, all of the Advocate caseloads were slightly reduced enabling more one-to-one time.

Certified Education Assistants (CEAs) in Elementary and Middle Schools

 CEAs were staffed in each elementary and middle school to assist students not meeting expectations for their grade levels. Additional time was added to middle school CEAs in 2009/2010.

Tutors in Secondary Schools

 A certified teacher was available during the school day in each secondary school to assist students with their assignments and exam preparations.

On May 20, 2010, there was a successful turnout for School District No. 23's annual Graduation Ceremony for the Aboriginal Education Program. 84 out of 154 students attended the graduation ceremony this year. Aboriginal students, from every school in the District, came together for the evening to celebrate the successful completion of their high school journey. The large attendance of 400 students and families was very inspiring to all, as this represents the pride in their accomplishments and the pride in being an Aboriginal person. This is the largest group of grade 12's to graduate from our district.

Summary

The 2009/2010 year has been a busy year with the Aboriginal Education Program seeing a change in its political structure. The Aboriginal Education Council, formerly the Aboriginal Education Committee, is now established along with a working committee that will advise and support the council. This change has been gradually implemented over the past year and it provides those

educators who are in the "frontlines" more of a voice in the program and, the ability to provide input into the program's direction.

In the past two years we have seen our highest number of and this year are anticipating graduates vet. we having 154 graduands. This increase is promising and it is a indicator of happening what is Aboriginal students in the Central Okanagan School District. The graduation ceremony was very memorable with approximately 400 guests attending. KSS gymnasium was filled with pride for the hard work and accomplishments of our graduates.



Many cultural performances took place this year and we were fortunate to have Dallas Arcand perform in a number of schools. In addition to the cultural performances, the program participated regularly in two after-school clubs that were held in West Kelowna and Lake Country. The Constable Neil Bruce Middle School (CNB) club's goal was to raise cultural awareness and offer some language acquisition to the students in West Kelowna. It was exciting to see the CNB club come to life, as we had more community involvement than we originally anticipated.

We hired more advocates this year to work with our students, and we recognize the advocates as an integral part of our program. In the community forums, we heard how much they are valued and the need for more advocates. The past year saw us making steps in a new direction with our AEC structure, three year cultural plan, more performances and hiring more advocates.

The Aboriginal graduation rate of 55% is a cause for concern. However, we must also recognize the strengths and gains made in recent history. Specifically, in the past two years we have had two of our largest graduation classes, more advocates in the schools and more cultural opportunities available. While there are some great things happening, it is important to hang onto the strengths and still change what needs changing. The community's input and trust is important in this process. Only with good relations and strong positive partnerships will the gains continue. Thank you for the opportunity over the last two years and it has been an honor to work alongside and feel welcomed by the Westbank First Nation and the school district. I wish the program and students many successes and may the advocates continue to, "Shine your light down on me, lift me up so I can see!"

Olympic Torch Ceremony

In collaboration with Westbank First Nation, school district students were trained to drum and sing the Okanagan song, to welcome the Olympic torch into the Okanagan Territory.

Toastmasters Training

An enrichment program offered after school to those senior high school students with Okanagan heritage. Students were trained in public speaking, to prepare them to be presenters at the Kelowna Art Gallery.

Family Gatherings

Over 200 Chief Tomat families and friends attended an evening of food, drumming and dancing. Students were trained in various traditional dances by Crystal Prince.

Winter Gatherings

Primary Aboriginal students from across the district attended Winter Gatherings at Central School. They experienced the richness of their culture through dance, story telling, food and cultural art.

Grade 12 Retreat

Thirty-eight Aboriginal students journeyed to Silver Lake Forestry camp for an overnight retreat to prepare for their graduation ceremony in May.

At the camp, with help from six Aboriginal student advocates, Aboriginal Cultural Facilitator Karen Chase and her assistant Claudia Hardy, Aboriginal Education Principal Jason Seright, Elder Vern Tronson, Okanagan language teacher Marlene Squakin and Leonard Raphael, the students received traditional teachings about the drum before they each had an opportunity to make one as well as a drum beater and drum bag.

"It was a great cultural experience that teaches you pride in your culture," was a comment by one of the attending students.

They also learned to make bannock, to respect their environment and each other, and to help with camp chores.

2010 Graduation Ceremony - Largest Grad Class!!

To celebrate the success of our Aboriginal students in their completion of 12 years of academic schooling, families, friends, school district staff, and community leaders/members gathered at Kelowna Secondary School for an evening of dinner and Pow Wow dancing.

Professional Development Opportunities and Cross Cultural Training

Becoming more aware of how Cultural beliefs and practices affect teaching practices will help individual teachers make better and more culturally responsive choices throughout the teaching day.

The following events were promoted and provided by the Aboriginal Education Program in collaboration with the community.

1. Dr. Martin Brokenleg Ed.D.

Educators and parents were invited to attend a workshop presented by Dr. Martin Brokenleg, Ed.D. on the Circle of Courage. This event was hosted by the Aboriginal Program. The feedback was overwhelmingly in favor of having similar CUPE 3523 workshops.

2. Leadership Academic Training

Cross Cultural training was provided by the Aboriginal Program and hosted at Westbank First Nation for future Principals of School District No. 23. Terry-Lee Beaudry and Norm Bradley requested this training with the belief that it would create a better understanding of Aboriginal students. The participants said "It was one of the best events they had attended".

3. Residential School Workshop

Support Staff of SD No. 23 attended the Residential School in Kamloops and attended various workshops and tours regarding the history of Residential Schools and the effects on the Aboriginal community.

4. Culture and Okanagan Language Club

This program is for our middle school Aboriginal students and provides continued knowledge and experience in the teachings of their Aboriginal culture and traditions. To date, the program has been a great success and has exceeded expectations. The community (including, elders, parents, siblings, and relatives) has joined in the after-school forums.

Families have been very supportive and have expressed their appreciation for the program and all that it offers. This program is offered at Constable Neil Bruce with the full support of staff and administration.

A variety of teachings are provided in areas of Dancing, Drumming, Birch Bark Basket Making, Stick Games, Plants, and the Okanagan Language.

5. Community Forums

Community forums were held May 3, 2010 at the Ki-Low-Na Friendship Society. Two questions were presented to the community; "What would you like to see from the Aboriginal Education Program?" and "What do you like about the Aboriginal Education Program?"

The following reflects the feedback from the proposed questions:

- "Advocates working to bring students together from other nearby schools to do cultural activities together"
- "More gatherings for families"
- "Big gatherings"
- "Good to hear FN cultural activities are being more evenly distributed throughout the district"
- "Lots of communication about events"



TERMS OF REFERENCE

WHEREAS:

"Targeted Aboriginal Education funding requires the collaboration of Boards of Education and local Aboriginal communities to develop and deliver Aboriginal Education Programs and Services that integrate academic achievement and Aboriginal culture and/or language." (British Columbia Ministry of Education Policy Statement, 2009)

WHEREAS:

The Board of Education of Central Okanagan School District believes that the Aboriginal students are best served when there is an Aboriginal Education Council who will oversee the implementation of the Enhancement Agreement, the Aboriginal targeted funding policy, and the expenditure of targeted dollars allocated for Aboriginal student programs in the Central Okanagan.

WHEREAS:

"The Enhancement Agreement, between the Aboriginal people in the Central Okanagan and the Central Okanagan School District, will respect the rights of all Aboriginal students to ensure that they receive quality education in the public school system and a meaningful graduation that provides a foundation for students to become successful, contributing members of community and society." (Aboriginal Enhancement Agreement, 2006)

THEREFORE:

The purpose of the Central Okanagan Aboriginal Education Council is to support, enhance, and increase school success for all Aboriginal students in the Central Okanagan. The Council will represent Aboriginal interests in the design, implementation, and assessment of programs and services that will improve the school experience and academic achievement of Aboriginal students.

TERMS OF REFERENCE

- 1. To oversee and evaluate the implementation of the Enhancement Agreement.
- 2. To work in partnership with Central Okanagan School District to determine programming and funding initiatives related to the Ministry of Education's Aboriginal Targeted Funding Policy.
- 3. To make recommendations, to the Board of Education, on any Ministry or local initiated changes to curriculum or services that will affect Aboriginal students.
- 4. To review District policies related to Aboriginal students and to recommend, to the Board of Education, appropriate changes.
- To ensure that Aboriginal language, history, culture, traditions, and contributions of Aboriginal people to Canadian society are recognized and incorporated in the school curriculum at all grade levels.
- 6. To ensure those current topics affecting Aboriginal peoples are presented in the curriculum from an Aboriginal perspective.
- 7. To review annually the Aboriginal Education programs, budget, and services for Aboriginal students.
- 8. To ensure that relevant Aboriginal student data are collected and reported annually.
- 9. To communicate with Aboriginal communities and parents on an ongoing basis.
- 10. To ensure that the interests of all Aboriginal students in the District are met regardless of residency.
- 11. To support the hiring of Aboriginal people within District programs and services.
- 12. To support research about Aboriginal education issues.
- 13. To promote Aboriginal cultural awareness within all staff groups in the District.
- 14. To provide direction to support the activities and initiatives of the District Aboriginal Advisory Committee.

COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP

Voting Council members will be the appointed representatives or alternates as follows:

- Three representatives from Westbank First Nation (WFN) one from Chief and Council, two appointed by Chief and Council
- One representative from Okanagan Nation Alliance
- One representative from Okanagan Indian Band
- One representative from Kelowna Métis Association
- Two representatives from Ki-Low-Na Friendship Society
- One representative from Lake Country Native Association
- Two representatives from the Aboriginal Parent and Family Education Council
- One Elder representative from the Okanagan Territory (who is an Okanagan speaker) appointed by Westbank First Nation Chief and Council.
- Two Central Okanagan School District Trustees

ELIGIBILITY TO VOTE CRITERIA

An application for representation as a voting member will be made to the Aboriginal Education Council. The Aboriginal Education Council will forward a recommendation to the Board of Education for final approval.

SCHOOL DISTRICT STAFF

To provide resources and support to the Council.

- Superintendent of Schools/Assistant Superintendent
- Director of Instruction responsible for the Aboriginal Education Program
- Principal of the Aboriginal Education Program

SELECTION OF MEMBERS

• Members representing a band or Aboriginal organization will be appointed by using the respected Band or organization process (Band Council Resolution or Letter of Motion).

LENGTH OF TERM

 Up to a three year renewable term, with a letter from the band or respective organization, confirming the appointment or reappointment.

CHAIR AND VICE-CHAIR

- The Chairperson will be appointed by Westbank First Nation Council member.
- The Chairperson will be responsible for presiding at all meetings and must perform such other duties as may be assigned to the Chairperson by the Council.
- In the absence of the Chairperson, the Vice-Chairperson must act in the place of the Chairperson.
- The Vice-Chairperson will be elected annually (June) by the Aboriginal Education Council.
- The Chairperson shall maintain order.

MEETINGS

- The Aboriginal Education Council will meet four times during the school year and may meet at such other times as necessary to carry out its responsibilities.
- The Aboriginal Council will meet with the Aboriginal Education Advisory Committee at least once in each calendar year to discuss budget, staffing, and updates/reports of the Aboriginal Education Program.
- A quorum is required to hold a meeting of the Aboriginal Education Council. A quorum means 50% plus one additional member in attendance. Council members are expected to attend ALL Council meetings and to report back decisions of the Council to their respective Band/organizations/communities.
- The Central Okanagan School District will appoint a person to the Aboriginal Education Council to take attendance of Council members present and record and distribute minutes of the meeting.

REVIEW AND AMEND TERMS OF REFERENCE

 The Board of Education for Central Okanagan School District, in consultation with the Aboriginal Education Council, will review and approve these Terms of Reference every three (3) years or one year prior to the signing of an Enhancement Agreement.



CENTRAL OKANAGAN SCHOOL DISTRICT ABORIGINAL EDUCATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

COMMITTEE PURPOSE

The purpose of the District Aboriginal Education Advisory Committee is to assist the Aboriginal Education Council in supporting, enhancing, and increasing school success for all Aboriginal learners in the Central Okanagan School District. The Committee will assist the Council by identifying program and service needs, and will provide input related to designing, implementing, and assessing programs and services that will enrich the school experience and improve the academic achievement of all Aboriginal students.

MANDATE

To assist the Aboriginal Education Council in the implementation of the Aboriginal Education Enhancement Agreement.

COMMITTEE REPRESENTATION

The Aboriginal Education Advisory Committee members will include (but not be limited to) a representative or alternate from the following organizations and District employee groups:

- Westbank First Nation
- Okanagan Indian Band
- Okanagan Nation Alliance
- Métis Association
- Métis Child and Family Services
- Ki-Low-Na Friendship Society
- Lake Country Native Association
- En'owkin Center
- UBC-O (Aboriginal Program and Services)
- Okanagan College (Aboriginal Access and Services)
- Director of Instruction responsible for the Aboriginal Education Program
- Aboriginal Education Program Principal
- School Principal/Vice-Principal (Elementary)
- School Principal/Vice-Principal (Middle/Secondary)
- Aboriginal Student Advocate (Elementary)
- Aboriginal Student Advocate (Middle/Secondary)
- Aboriginal Education Program Cultural Facilitator

As the Committee meetings are generally open to the public, Aboriginal Elders and parents/caregivers of Aboriginal students are welcome to attend.

COMMITTEE ROLE

- To provide research, background data, and recommendations to the Council as requested by the Aboriginal Education Council.
- To recommend to the Council, funding priorities related to Aboriginal Targeted Funding.
- To generally advise and provide well formulated recommendations to the Council
 on issues related to Aboriginal education including: program initiatives,
 Okanagan Language instruction, data collection, strategies for involving
 Aboriginal parents and families, Aboriginal cultural awareness within the District,
 program reviews, and other relevant areas related to Aboriginal education in the
 District.
- To appoint sub-committees in consultation with all members of the Committee. Sub-committees may be formed for specific issues and may include Aboriginal Student Advocates, Tutors, and CEAs and other staff or community members (i.e. planning events, problem solving, program review, and graduation).
- To commit to regularly attending the Aboriginal Education Advisory Committee meetings.

MEETINGS

The Committee will meet once a month from October through May (except December). Decisions will be reached through discussion and consensus. The Principal of the Aboriginal Education Program will serve as the meeting Chair. In the Principal's absence, a senior staff member will be appointed as Chair.

The Committee will report to Council as required.

Minutes recorded by the Recording Secretary will be accepted by a consensus of Committee Members and included as information on the next Council Agenda.

Central Okanagan School District will appoint a person to the Aboriginal Education Advisory Committee to take attendance of Committee members present and record and distribute minutes of the meeting.

COMMITTEE MEETING RULES

The goal is to promote a balance of meeting fairness, efficiency, and respect. Meetings should provide an equal opportunity for all participants to speak. Meetings should be efficient so that time is spent on discussion relevant to the purview of the Committee.

LENGTH OF TERM

A one year renewable term, with a letter from the band or respective organization, confirming the appointment or reappointment.
