Chair Jordan Coble welcomed everyone to the IEC meeting. Bruce McKay, Acting District Vice-Principal of Indigenous Education, was introduced by Jesse Bruce, Director of Instruction – Indigenous Education and Equity, and welcomed as a guest. Bruce McKay will support the Indigenous Education Department until the vacant position for the District Vice-Principal of Indigenous Education is filled.

#### 5. Presentation

#### 5.1 Research Project: KINdling q'wiłmi?st: Putting kinSHIFT Schools into Practice

Kelly Terbasket, IndigenEYEZ and kinSHIFT; Dr. Natalie Cohen, Okanagan College; Dr. Bill Cohen, Okanagan School of Education; and, Jordan Kleckner, Director of Instruction – Learning and Innovation, spoke about the multiyear (2023-2026) collaborative research project that began with the delivery of kinSHIFT Schools, a professional learning four-part workshop series, to five school teams and over forty educators during the 2023-2024 school year. The workshops focused on experiential, relational work to support school teams and educators to become more effective communities of practice in decolonizing and transforming school culture by shifting their stories, actions, visions, and relationships. During the 2024-2025 school year, the research project called "KINdling q'wiłmi?st: Putting kinSHIFT Schools into Practice" will build upon last year's kinSHIFT Schools sessions and will deepen the participant's learning through proposed research activities that will support them to put their learning into practice.

The Superintendent of Schools and the Deputy Superintendent of Schools shared that the District fully supports the "KINdling q'wiłmi?st: Putting kinSHIFT Schools into Practice" research project transition to year two and is committing budgetary contributions to the project. IEC members around the table each shared their support of the research project.

Chair Coble queried the IEC if they support the continuation of this learning in the schools and if they approve the use of \$1500 from targeted funding to support the work. The IEC unanimously agreed to support year two of "KINdling q'witmi?st: Putting kinSHIFT Schools into Practice" in Central Okanagan Public Schools.

#### 6. STANDING ITEMS

#### **6.1 District Updates**

The Superintendent of Schools announced that Terry Beaudry, Deputy Superintendent of Schools, has accepted a temporary secondment to the Ministry of Education and Child Care from October 1<sup>st</sup> to November 30<sup>th</sup> to support the Framework for Enhancing Student Learning (FESL) annual report review work. Terry Beaudry shared that it will be a wonderful privilege to join the Ministry team to review all the District FESL annual reports from around the province and that she has confidence in the leadership of the Indigenous Education administration team during her absence.

The Superintendent of Schools shared that the District is actively recruiting for another District Vice-Principal of Indigenous Education and will be looking to the IEC members for participation in the process as in the past.

The Superintendent of Schools commended the IEC for the amendments made to the IEC Terms of Reference last spring 2024, and that the Ministry used the IEC TOR as an example while creating the template Terms of Reference for all IECs in the province. This District is a model for the rest of the province and this IEC is part of the model.

Terry Beaudry shared that the Powell River School District is in the process of developing an Indigenous Education Council and are hoping to meet with IEC leadership via Zoom for helpful insight. This request will be shared with Chair Jordan Coble and Vice-Chair Nicole Werstuik.

Jordan Coble congratulated Terry Beaudry on her secondment with the Ministry and shared that the legacy and consistency of the work of everyone around the IEC table needs to be acknowledged. This is a team victory and shows that the work is being done for the right reasons.

The Superintendent of Schools shared that Central Okanagan Public Schools is a growing District of over 25,000 students; however, enrolment is not growing as fast as was projected last spring. The District's budget is a projected, or estimated, budget which is funded by actual student enrolment numbers at the end of September. Since enrolment did not grow as much as expected, there is a significant cost pressure that the District is currently addressing. The Superintendent of Schools shared a few examples of how the District may find savings in the District budget. The District is still growing in student numbers, newcomers are still arriving, school startup was relatively smooth, and students are excited to be back in school.

#### 6.2 Community Updates

Indigenous Education Council members spoke of the following:

- The WFN youth outdoor kitchen has been made available to be used by the Land Based Love (LBL) program from October to January, and the use may be extended for the full school year.
   WFN would like to pilot a similar project and hope to drop into the kitchen and see the work being done by the LBL program.
- WFN youth and students at MBSS are now able to earn external credentials through cultural
  activities and programs offered by Westbank First Nation. The process of authorizing the
  external credentials with the Ministry was lengthy, although necessary, and benefits students
  struggling to acquire enough credits for graduation.
- The construction of the new Okanagan Indian Band (OKIB) Cultural Immersion Elementary School is scheduled to be completed in 2025. The school capacity is outgrown before the school is finished and OKIB is now in the process of adding an addition to the building.
- The Lake Country Native Association (LCNA) Traditional Pow Wow will take place on November 23<sup>rd</sup> and posters are coming out soon. The location of the gathering is still to be determined. Forty-three people attended the September 15<sup>th</sup> LCNA cultural gathering which included a presentation about the return of the salmon.
- The Kelowna Métis Association (KMA) is contributing \$10,000 to the District this week to support the purchase of educational materials for students in Grades 4 through Grade 8 in Central Okanagan Public Schools. The KMA Annual General Meeting is on October 26<sup>th</sup> and KMA is still in the process of filling the empty seat on the IEC.

- Ki-Low-Na Friendship Society will gather on September 27th from 12 pm to 4 pm to commemorate the September 30<sup>th</sup> National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.
- Sncewips Heritage Museum is hosting a special "Work of the Heart" art exhibit on the September 30<sup>th</sup> National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.
- Westbank First Nation and the West Kelowna RCMP Indigenous Police Service are hosting the annual Truth and Reconciliation canoe journey across Okanagan Lake on September 27th. The canoes will paddle from Kelowna's City Park across the water to Westbank First Nation Beach.
- Trustee Fraser attended an Indigenous focused conference in Toronto this past summer. Many of the workshops centered around the topic of advancing Indigenous student education.

# 6.3 <u>Indigenous "Kids in Care" in the School District, Tutors, and Wrap-Around Services of Support</u>

Chair Jordan Coble commented that when challenges are identified in the school community on an ongoing basis, there is much work that comes from this. Jordan expressed gratitude for the work of the Indigenous Student Advocates as they provide year around support to Indigenous students and build trust in the relationships with students on their educational journey. Indigenous students can also request support through the Child and Youth Advocacy Centre of Kelowna.

#### 6.5 Parent and Family Community Engagement

Jesse Bruce, Director of Instruction – Indigenous Education and Equity, provided an update on the selection process of Indigenous parent representatives on the Indigenous Education Council. Five parents have expressed interest to serve as members on the IEC and will attend the next IEC meeting on November 5<sup>th</sup> to introduce themselves to the Council. The Council will select two parent representatives, one from WFN or OKIB, to serve as voting members on the IEC and to support the restart of the Indigenous Parent and Family Education Council. Prior to the November 5<sup>th</sup> IEC meeting, Council members will need to sign a Confidentiality Agreement, provided by Human Resources, so they can be involved in the selection process.

Jesse Bruce shared that the Indigenous Education Department is still keen to provide a Fall family event for Indigenous students and families. More information will be coming soon.

Nicole Werstuik shared that WFN is hosting a community BBQ on October 9<sup>th</sup> and invited the Council to set up an information booth.

#### 7. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

## 7.1 <u>Draft Equity in Action for Truth and Reconciliation 2020-2025: Fourth Annual Report 2023/2024</u>

Jesse Bruce, Director of Instruction – Indigenous Education and Equity, provided copies of the draft Equity in Action for Truth and Reconciliation Fourth Annual Report for the Indigenous Education Council to review.

The IEC that attended the meeting in person divided themselves into three groups, led by Terry Beaudry, Christie Russell, and Jesse Bruce, to review a section of the report and provide feedback. Updates will be made to the final draft of the report, based on the feedback from the IEC, before the report is forwarded to the Board of Education.

The IEC expressed gratitude for the many contributors to the Equity in Action for Truth and Reconciliation Fourth Annual Report 2023/2024. A special recognition was extended to the District's Advocates, Wellness Workers, Cultural Department, Early Learning Team, Land-Based Team, and Success Teachers for impacting students and families in positive ways every day, which goes beyond the powerful images and articles that were captured in the annual report.

#### 7.2 Indigenous Education Department Updates

Jesse Bruce, Director of Instruction – Indigenous Education and Equity, and Christie Russell, District Vice-Principal of Indigenous Education, shared that schools were fully staffed with Indigenous Student Advocates for the September startup. Jesse expressed appreciation to Chair Jordan Coble and Vice-Chair Nicole Werstuik for reviewing and revising the posting advertisement for the position of District Vice-Principal of Indigenous Education. Applications for the position will be reviewed on October 11<sup>th</sup> and the posting will remain open until it is filled.

#### 7.3 IEC Terms of Reference Amendments

Jesse Bruce shared that the IEC were working through refining the IEC Terms of Reference (TOR) last spring 2024 when the process was put on pause due to receiving the new Ministerial Order for Indigenous Education Councils in BC in June 2024. In mid August, the District received the Ministry's new Indigenous Education Council Policy and the Ministry's template Terms of Reference for all IEC's. At a special IEC meeting on August 29<sup>th</sup>, the IEC formed a Terms of Reference Subcommittee that met together on September 19<sup>th</sup> to continue drafting the TOR. Jesse thanked Yvonne Hildebrandt, Secretariat to the IEC, for her work ahead of the subcommittee meeting to combine the Ministry's template TOR with the IEC's amended TOR and for creating one document. The subcommittee worked through the updated combined document at the September 19<sup>th</sup> subcommittee meeting and created a new draft Terms of Reference for the IEC to review.

The IEC reviewed the first six sections of the new draft Terms of Reference, provided feedback, and made revisions. The remaining sections of the draft Terms of Reference will be reviewed at the next IEC meeting with a goal to finalize the TOR and move forward with an updated IEC Terms of Reference.

The Chair thanked the Terms of Reference Subcommittee for their work revising the new draft IEC Terms of Reference.

## 7.5 <u>Updates on the September 30<sup>th</sup> National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, Orange Shirt Day, and the October 11<sup>th</sup> District Implementation Day</u>

Christie Russell, District Vice-Principal of Indigenous Education shared the District's plans for the September 27<sup>th</sup> Orange Shirt Day and the October 11<sup>th</sup> District Implementation Day. On September 27<sup>th</sup>, school learning will include teaching the history and story behind Orange Shirt Day so they understand the September 30<sup>th</sup> National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. In preparation for the October 11<sup>th</sup> District Implementation Day, the Indigenous Education Cultural Department has done pre-teaching with school principals and vice-principals to ensure they have authentic ways of learning with staff on Implementation Day. The learning will include school teams going on retreats to learn about land acknowledgments and the Land Based Learning team teaching about traditional Indigenous homes.

Chair Jordan Coble shared that September 30<sup>th</sup> is a sombre day for the people in the communities; and, he loves that students can celebrate together in an environment that is about togetherness. Jordan acknowledged that all the work being done in the schools is so important. As much as it is hard and tough, the joy and sense of pride felt when survivors hold the young children is worth it. The work being done is transformational.
